

Dear Students

SA Health and the Department for Education has provided guidance on how to manage cases of COVID-19 in schools.

There will be new contact tracing and close contact arrangements in place at the college from 31 January 2022.

The new arrangements recognise the importance of providing quality education and care for our students while minimising the risk of COVID-19 transmission.

Marden Senior College will remain open if there is a case of COVID-19 under the new arrangements.

It's very important that parents/caregivers and students notify us immediately if a student tests positive to COVID-19.

Please email [absence@msc.sa.edu.au](mailto:absence@msc.sa.edu.au) and provide the following details:

1. Student first name
2. Student last name
3. Student mobile number
4. (If under 18) parent/caregiver mobile number is required
5. Date that Student's symptoms were first noticed
6. Date that Student's positive test was taken

Please note the College will ring to collect further details.

If a student or teacher in your class tests positive for COVID-19, they will be deemed a classroom contact and the following will occur:

- We will notify all parent/caregivers/ students in that class of the positive case
- All students without symptoms can continue attending the college. No rapid antigen testing will be required.
- If students develops any symptoms (even mild) please stay home and get a COVID-19 test.

Any student who has worked 1:1 with a COVID positive staff member (more than 15mins, indoors, in close proximity and where face masks are not able to be worn) will be asked to complete 7 days of rapid antigen testing ('test to stay') each morning before attending the college. We will provide you with the testing kits at no charge. Students that test positive must not attend the college.

Alternatively, if students do not want to complete the 7-day testing, students can quarantine for 7 days. Absent students can access subject resources and lesson instructions via Daymap and the Moodle.

The Chief Public Health Officer (CPHO) has recommended that classroom contacts should avoid the following between days 1 to 7 of exposure:

- attending extra-curricular-based activities for 7 days (such as excursions/ assemblies - noting most of these activities have been temporarily suspended until week 4 by the college).

The CPHO advises classroom contacts should do the following to minimise risk to others, when outside of the college between days 1 to 14 of exposure:

- avoid high risk settings or COVID Management Plan events
- wear a surgical mask around others (where age appropriate) and outside your home
- avoid contact with vulnerable people outside of your workplace or family, where possible
- avoid non-essential activities where possible (eg where there are lots people, inside, in close contact)
- avoid shared spaces and maintain physical distance.

Our staff will also undergo 7 days of rapid antigen testing (test to stay) in the event that they are in a classroom with a student or colleague who tests positive.

It's vitally important that students please:

- do not attend the college and stay home if they are:
  - unwell
  - experiencing any COVID-19 symptoms
  - any other member of the household has COVID-19
  - they are a close contact for a person who has COVID-19 and are required to quarantine
- notify us asap if you tests positive for COVID-19. Please email [absence@msc.sa.edu.au](mailto:absence@msc.sa.edu.au)
- Please note that masks are required for all students in years 11, 12 & 13 when indoors. We will have supplies for students to wear if students don't already have one.

These new settings will be in place until the end of week 4 of term 1. However, with the rapidly changing nature of the pandemic, this may be reviewed or changed if and when needed. As always, we must remain flexible and responsive.

I understand you may have a lot of questions about this information. We'll continue to provide you information as soon as we have it.

Thank you for your understanding and support in implementing these temporary measures as we continue to adjust to this rapidly changing pandemic.
