#### **From the Principal**



With the first semester now at an end, I acknowledge the commitment of the college community in supporting our students to settle into strong routines and to engage with their learning, teachers and peers. Students are now accustomed to the requirements of their subjects and the commitment needed to be successful in the SACE and VET. Teachers have been working alongside students to consolidate the skills, knowledge and capabilities to support successful SACE completion. Students have been engaged in formative and summative work and teachers have been monitoring learning and providing timely feedback. Having visited classrooms, I have observed first hand, students actively engaged in learning with their peers and subject teachers.

The Marden Senior College Strategic Plan (2023 to 2025) with its focus on 'inspiring and empowering students to develop capabilities for personal excellence and successful futures,' underpinned by the values of Excellence, Respect and Diversity continues to guide our directions, priorities and practice.

Marden prides itself on excellence and individual success, and our 2023 results and university preference outcomes support this. An impressive 54% of Stage 2 MSC students achieved A grades, compared to the state mean of 32%, with 159 A+ scores that included 57 Merits. The College also saw significant success in the VET and FLO programs. These outstanding results reflect the breadth of opportunities and diverse learning programs and pathways offered at Marden, along with the dedication and expertise of our educators. Heartfelt congratulations to all our students and their families on these noteworthy accomplishments.

Our foremost objective remains enhancing student success through personalized, differentiated, and high-quality instruction. To strengthen pedagogy and ensure consistency in practices, literacy development takes centre stage in our site improvement plan, accompanied by a comprehensive professional learning program.

In this newsletter, we present an overview of the college's extensive array of programs and events designed to foster students' capabilities and qualities such as ethical citizenship. These efforts include, student led lunch time activities promoting the importance of Harmony Day and Reconciliation week which received widespread support. The Year 12 students attended a workshop facilitated by 'Elevate' in 'exam readiness' underscored by the importance of strong work routines and management of wellbeing. Stage 1 students attended a road safety awareness program, (RAP) and learnt about the importance of safe and responsible driving and a compelling workshop facilitated by the Sammy D Foundation. Career workshops, tertiary visits and seminars provided valuable information to support student pathway discussions. Furthermore, students participated in a range of lunchtime activities in the Library, VET industry classroom visits, and a student run Cyber Connection Expo.

There are many opportunities at Marden and I encourage all students to participate in co-curricular programs, activities and events. We look forward to hosting the MSC 2024 Formal on Friday 26 July 6 to 10pm at the Hilton Hotel and acknowledging this important milestone with our students. Staff met on student free days to work on college, leaning area and teacher and ancillary priorities. These programs provided a good opportunity to undertake rich discussion and capture perspectives to support college wide improvement including the new Department for Education Strategy.

In the last week of the term 2, students also undertook trial exams in a range of stage 2 subjects. Students need to use this experience and results to guide them as to what learning and study patterns they need to consolidate and revise before the end of year exams. With the recent semester change, I am pleased to undergo 22 new students to Mardon Serier

to welcome 33 new students to Marden Senior College community. These students have a strong sense of the opportunities Marden offers, and we look forward to working in partnership with them and their families to ensure a successful learning experience at Marden Senior College.

I wish the school community an enjoyable break and look forward to a busy term 3 at Marden Senior College.

Guest speakers shared their personal journeys in accounting, spanning from their high school experiences to their current professional roles. The networking segment at the end facilitated valuable exchanges of information among students, teachers, and guests alike.



#### **Marden Education Centre Library**

#### P.A.R.T.Y Program

Twenty-nine Stage 2 Health & Wellbeing students attended the Prevent Alcohol and Risk-Related Trauma in Youth (P.A.R.T.Y) program on Friday 5 April. Students learnt about how different behaviours are classed as high-risk taking behaviours such as; alcohol, drugs, driving and other risk-taking behaviours and the consequences that the behaviours can have. This program is run by emergency department nurses who gave different stories of their experiences with young people who engage in risk taking behaviour and end up in hospital.



#### **Sammy D Foundation**

Stage 1 students participated in a compelling Sammy D Foundation: Violence Prevention "Impact" workshop on Thursday 6 June. It was delivered by Neil Davis who shared his family's experience of losing their son and brother Sam, to a one punch hit at a party. The session was interactive, provocative and emotional for all with a clear message for young people around the use of alcohol and violence. The recently appointed CEO of SA Power Networks who provide extensive sponsorship to the Sammy D foundation, attended the session to hear Neil's story.



Students also got the opportunity to follow a trauma patient via a mannequin through the journey that they would take in the emergency department. Other interactive activities included eating foods suitable for a spinal patient. putting a shirt on with arm and buttering bread with one hand. These simulated everyday tasks which become difficult after a trauma incident. The day finished with a presentation from a trauma victim who survived a car accident. He shared his confronting story with students who were able to ask questions about his situation. Feedback from the students was overwhelmingly positive. Students are now writing an assessment task related to their experience at the program.







#### **Parliament House Visit**

The Stage 2 People & Politics students visited Parliament House, where they observed a live parliamentary session. During the visit, students witnessed engaging debates and participated in the question time, gaining first hand insight into the workings of a parliamentary sitting. The experience provided them with a deeper understand of how politics works.



#### **Student Government Association (SGA)**

The Student Government Association (SGA) at Marden Senior College has been hard at work this semester, promoting student voice and making positive changes across the school. From designing the new 2024 MSC jumper to organizing Harmony Day activities, the SGA has been dedicated to creating a vibrant and inclusive school community.

One of the highlights of the semester was the successful celebration of National Reconciliation Week, led by SGA member Denek. The SGA organised various activities, including a playlist featuring indigenous artists, a PPT display on significant historical events, and a visit from Kaurna elder, Allen Edwards.

The SGA also held feedback sessions on proposed school library plans, with students eagerly sharing their thoughts on the development of this space.

Nav Virk organized a festive and celebratory conclusion to the semester for her Stage 1 Psychology students. Students received mini graduation hats and certificates, and enjoyed a spread of food to commemorate their achievements and success. In addition, the SGA has been planning the upcoming school Formal, scheduled for Term 3 Week 1 Friday 26 July 6pm at the Hilton Hotel. From promoting to organising decorations and entertainment, the SGA is committed to making the event a memorable one for all students.

Furthermore, the SGA has provided valuable input on the design of a new wellbeing space in classroom G9, suggesting features such as a mural, comfortable seating, and quiet study areas. The students believe this space will greatly benefit students.

Overall, the SGA looks forward to continuing their positive momentum throughout the year. Students can expect more initiatives driven by the SGA to enhance the school experience for everyone.

#### **Elevate Study Workshop**

The Elevate workshop provided an interactive and engaging opportunity for approximately 60 Year 12s to explore study tips including how to plan for exams, notetaking and time management. The presenter was energetic and connected positively with all participants.



#### **Stage 1 Legal Studies**

The Stage 1 Legal Studies class delivered a successful mock trial presentation as part of their course. Students confidently assumed the roles of defense, prosecution, and witnesses, showcasing their understanding of legal principles and processes. The experience proved both fun and engaging, providing an authentic learning opportunity that enhanced their grasp of the subject matter. Michelle's guidance as the both teacher and 'Judge' on the day ensured that students not only learned but also enjoyed the process of applying legal concepts in a real-world context.







#### **National Reconciliation Week**

The SGA planned a successful and engaging program acknowledging National Reconciliation Week (NRW) 27 May to 3 June. This year's theme is 'Now More Than Ever'.

NRW is a time for all Australians to learn about our shared histories, cultures, and achievements, and to explore how each of us can contribute to achieving reconciliation in Australia. Denek, a member of the SGA and an Aboriginal man from the 'wemba wemba yota yota' tribe has been instrumental in guiding the SGA to develop a program that promotes awareness, discussion and reflection. Denek highlighted in his speech that reconciliation







for him is 'about healing and doing better, doing better for the land and by respecting it and looking after it' and 'doing better for Indigenous people by respecting their traditions and acknowledging their trauma and that they are traditional owners of the land we live on.' A shining example of student leadership and agency.

Students and staff readily engaged in the activities to learn about Aboriginal culture and history.







#### **Cyber Connection Expo**









The Cyber Security students for organised a Cyber Connection Expo on Wednesday 4 June. This was a student led initiative and they did a fantastic job in the planning, marketing and hosting this engaging event. Students worked in teams and prepared a range of interactive and innovative cyber security topics and activities to showcase. A very successful event highlighting the talent and skill set of our cyber security students.

#### **AHSP Interactive Industry Expo**

On Friday 14 June the AHSP (Adelaide Hills Student Pathways) Interactive Industry Expo welcomed approximately 40 prospective year 10 students from the Adelaide Hills for 2025. Amanda representing our MSC RTO engaged students in an interactive session focused on the animation principle of Squash and Stretch. Using traditional clay and stop-motion techniques on iPads, students enthusiastically applied these principles, which are integral to higher education learning. They also delved into storyboarding and camera angles, crafting short, humorous narratives about morning routines. The students took pride in showcasing their animations and presenting their storyboard pitches. Despite the lack of computer access, Amanda was able to teach foundational skills in an enjoyable manner, showcasing past student work and explaining course details effectively.
